White Goods & Tires will be Collected During the Week of October 28, 2019 on Your Regular Trash Collection Day!

- White Goods \$12- Refrigerators, Washers, Dryers, Stoves, Air Conditioners, Dishwashers, Freezers, Hot Water Heaters, Dehumidifiers, Furnaces, Microwaves, etc. (APPLIANCES ONLY!)
- Tires \$3- May be on or off the rim.







Residents are asked to place these items at their regular trash collection site the evening before pickup. A special tag must be placed on each item to be disposed of. Tags may be purchased at the Borough Office, M-F, 7 AM—4 PM, or at the Milanof-Schock Library, 1184 Anderson Ferry Road, during their hours of operation. Tags MUST be purchased no later than 2 PM the day before your collection.

Trash Collection Procedures & Guidelines



Collection can begin as early as 5 AM on your assigned pickup day. Basic service includes three (3) 32-gallon refuse bags/cans. Each bag/can is limited to 30 pounds. Customers are asked to place trash/recycling containers at your pickup site the evening before your assigned day and should be removed promptly after 6 PM. If your trash is missed, please do not remove it from your pickup site. Call the Borough Office before 11 AM the next day at (717) 653-2300 and arrangements will be made to have it picked up.

Special Tags

- ORANGE (Extra Bag Tag) \$1.50 Each- For additional 32-gallon bags or cans, not weighing more than 30 pounds each.
- RED (Oversized Items) \$4 Each- For refuse that will not fit into refuse containers. (ex. Small furniture, carpet, and like items). Limit of two per week.
- KRAFT BAGS (Yard Waste excluding grass) \$0.50 Each- For Woody Waste only. Kraft Bags (trimmings and shrubbery) shall not weigh more than 30 pounds.

Cordboard Recycling Dympsters Available At 2 Locations

Mount Joy Borough has two cardboard **ONLY** recycling dumpsters at the Parks Department Building, 134 North Market Avenue and two cardboard ONLY recycling dumpsters located in the parking lot of Little Chiques Park on Park Avenue. There is a slot in each dumpster that you can just slide the cardboard through. If anyone has any questions or comments, please call the Borough Office at (717) 653-2300.

Commercial, Industrial, Public & Multi-Family Units Recycling Requirements

Pennsylvania's Act 101 and Mount Joy Borough's Ordinance 487 requires all commercial, industrial, public (schools), community events and multi-family units to recycle. Act 101 also requires municipalities and counties to track and report "post-consumer" recyclables that have been collected and marketed such as clear & colored glass, aluminum, steel &

bimetallic cans, corrugated cardboard, plastic, yard waste, leaves, tires and white goods.

Option one is to have your materials collected curbside by Mount Joy Borough's licensed hauler. You would pay a semi-annual bill directly to the Borough for refuse and recycling collection.

Option two is to opt out of the Borough's collection program and contract with a private hauler. Annual proof of collection is required with this option via an Annual Recycling Report that will be mailed each January.



COMPOST SITE

MOUNT JOY BORO/EAST DONEGAL TOWNSHIP FACILITY REGULATIONS:

- The site accepts yard waste materials (sticks, branches, etc.).
- The following items will <u>not</u> be accepted: grass clippings, tree branches/trunks over 19" in diameter and/or over 8' in length, tree stumps, construction/demolition waste (boards, etc.).
- Yard waste is not required to be bagged, but if you prefer to do so, Kraft Bags can be purchased at the Borough Office at 21 East Main Street, Mount Joy, or at the Milanof-Schock Library, 1184 Anderson Ferry Road, Mount Joy.

Hours & Directions

From East Main St., turn onto S. Barbara St., make a left onto E. Donegal St., then a right onto S. Jacob St. Follow S. Jacob St. until you can go no further. Arrive at the Compost Facility.

The Mount Joy Borough/East Donegal Township facility will be open every Friday from 3—6 PM and every Saturday from 9 AM—12 PM through November 16.

The Compost Site will be CLOSED for the season beginning November 17, 2019. The site will be open again on a regular schedule starting April 2020.

Woody Waste Pickup Schedule

Yard waste collection will take place on your regular collection day on the following days in 2019:

October 2019

1, 2, 14, 15, 16, 28, 29, 30



2019 Leaf Collection

Leaf Collection will start November 4 and run through December 6 in the Borough. The following guidelines are to be followed for those participating in the pickup.

- •Leaves must be raked into piles at the edge of the street or alley in plain view and far enough away from parked vehicles. The Public Works Department is not permitted to go onto anyone's property to collect leaves.
- •Remove large sticks, branches, metal, lumber, rocks and/or plastic objects from leaf pile. Such items may cause damage to the equipment or employees and cause a delay in collection.
- •If leaves piled by the curb have not been picked up within one week, please call the Borough Office at 717-653-2300 and leave your name and address as a reminder.
- Please do NOT bag leaves.



Mount Joy Borough Re-Apportionment

Mount Joy Borough currently has a three-voting ward system known as the East Ward, West Ward and Florin Ward. Voters elect three Councilors from each of the three wards for a total of nine Councilors on a staggered basis.

The primary reason that the ward system was reviewed is the population numbers per ward was very unequal. Based on the 2010 US Census, the residents per ward was as follows:

Pre-reapportionment population per ward: Post-reapportionment population per ward:

Florin Ward: 3,404 Florin Ward 2,409 West Ward: 2,151 West Ward 2,507 East Ward: 1,855 East Ward 2,494

The Pennsylvania Borough Code § 601(d) Composition states "All wards in the borough shall be numbered and composed of compact and contiguous territory as nearly equal in population as practicable as officially and finally reported in the latest official census".

The Borough Council adopted ordinance No. 4-18 on June 4, 2018 that has redrawn the Borough ward boundaries with an effective date of January 1, 2019. The Lancaster County Voter Registration Office notified any Borough voter that was affected by this change by sending new voter registration cards to approximately 1,109 affected Mount Joy Borough voters. 

STORWWATER TIPS FOR FALL

Too Many Leaves?...Use them to your advantage!!!

Insulate Tender Plants: A 6-inch blanket of leaves protects tender plants from winter wind and cold. Cover cold-hardy vegetables—such as carrots, kale, leeks and beets—and you'll be able to harvest them all winter.

Boost Your Compost Pile: Carbon-rich leaves balance high-nitrogen compost ingredients such as fresh grass clippings.

Improve Your Soil: Mix shredded leaves right into your garden. Next spring, your soil will be teeming with earthworms and other beneficial organisms.

Make "Leaf Mold": Simply rake the leaves into a big pile. If you shred them, they will decompose faster, but you can still make leaf mold without shredding. After one to three years, fungus will have broken the leaves down to a special compost that smells like a walk through the woods. Leaf mold is high in calcium and magnesium and retains three to five times its weight in water—rivaling peat moss.

It is that time of year again- fall is here! Mount Joy Borough would like to remind you of the importance of preventing stormwater pollution while you make the most of the . fall season. Stormwater is formed when rainwater makes its way into storm drains or runs off our properties directly into streams. On its journey to the stream, stormwater can pick up harmful substances that pollute our watershed.

Think Before You Shred

- Be careful with some kinds of leaves. Walnut, eucalyptus and camphor laurel leaves contain substances that inhibit plant growth. It's best to compost these leaves before using them in your garden.
- Be sure to chop or shred leaves before using them as mulch. Whole leaves can form a mat that water can't penetrate.
- If you add shredded leaves right to the soil, add some slow-release nitrogen fertilizers to help the leaves decompose and to ensure that soil microbes don't use all of the available nitrogen.

Old Prescription Disposal




CVS Pharmacy provided us with a drop box for unwanted medication. The box is located inside the front lobby and is accessible anytime the Borough Offices are open to the public. Instructions are posted on top of the box, and clear plastic baggies are provided for depositing medications.

- Medications MUST be dumped out of the original prescription bottle and put into a baggie (baggies are also provided at the office).
- They may be mixed together with other medications.
- NO liquids, NO ointments and NO creams.
- Pills and capsules ONLY.
- DO NOT put old prescriptions in the Borough Over Night Drop Box.
- Pills and Capsules in foil packs, MUST be removed from the packets.

Avoid the "Second Shovel"

After a snowstorm, how many times have you shoveled your driveway only to have it plowed in when your local snowplow comes through? Clearing an area to the right of your driveway (as seen in the diagram below), giving the snow on the plow a place to go other than your driveway, should keep you from having to do the same job twice.



Snow and Ice Removal

Snow and ice are to be removed from all sidewalks in front of or alongside properties within 24 hours after such snow and ice has stopped. There shall be a clear walk which must be at least 3' wide along the entire length of the sidewalk. In the event the snow and ice becomes so hard it cannot be removed, sand or another abrasive can be placed upon the sidewalk to make travel reasonably safe and, as weather permits, proceed to clear a path.

An accumulation of snow and ice on a building or any other structure which is liable to fall on any sidewalk, roadway or other public way must be removed within a reasonable time, but no later than 24 hours after the cessation of any fall of snow, sleet or freezing rain.

Snow and ice shall also be removed surrounding a fire hydrant, and no snow shall be deposited immediately next to a fire hydrant, or on any sidewalk, travel lane of a street or loading or unloading area of public transportation system.





Regarding Water Main Breaks

There is very specific protocol required by DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) when a water main break occurs. Depending on how and what type of break happens, precautionary boil notices will be put out. When you see the boil notice, there isn't necessarily a problem; we are just following DEP protocol. Please feel free to contact the Mount Joy Borough Authority at (717) 653-5938 if you see a boil notice and have any questions.





Mount Joy Borough Authority has contracted with SWIFT Reach Network to have an immediate response mechanism to alert you of any important news relative to your water/sewer service. Currently we have basic information for most property owners. You are able to access this file to add/change items, such as cell phone or other electronic devices such as e-mail. Please visit mountjoyborough.com and click on the link to the left that says "Police", then follow to the link that says "Swift 911 Emergency" to submit your information electronically. This system will also be available for use by the Borough and Police Department to alert you of emergencies.

Meters are read four times per year, typically in February, May, August and November. Each quarter when this is completed there are always a few meters that did not read for various reasons. When this happens this will require a work order be generated for each of those particular properties. Once a work order is created, one of the Mount Joy Borough Authority employees will come out to look at the problem and fix it. Each employee will always have proper identification on them so you can verify that they are in fact an employee of Mount Joy Borough Authority. 
Things You Can Do To Prevent Water Waste



• Check your toilets for leaks. (Put food coloring in your toilet tank. If, without flushing, the color begins to appear in the bowl, you have a leak that should be repaired.)

- Replace older toilets with efficient water saving toilets.
- Check all faucets, pipes, hoses and couplings for leaks inside and outside of your home. (Leaks outside the house may not seem as bad because they're not as visible. They can be just as wasteful as leaks inside.)
- Rinse your razor in the sink.
- Turn off the water after you wet your toothbrush.
- Use your automatic dishwasher and washing machine only for full loads.
- If you wash dishes by hand, don't leave the water running for rinsing.
- Don't let the faucet run while cleaning vegetables.
- Keep a bottle of drinking water in the refrigerator.
- Water you lawn only when it needs it.
- Deep-soak your lawn. Water during the cool parts of the day. (Early morning is better than dusk because it helps prevent growth of fungus.)
- Plant drought-resistant trees and plants.
- Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants. (Mulch slows evaporation of moisture and discourages weed growth.)
- Don't water the gutter.
- Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.
- Don't run the hose while washing your car.
- Tell your children not to play with the hose and sprinklers.
- Take shorter showers.
- Install water-saving showerheads or flow restrictors.
- Take baths.

What is a Green Burial?

More people today are exploring green burial options, a more environmentally friendly process for funerals. Some people prefer not to use embalming fluids, which can be harmful to the environment, if not handled properly. Also, caskets are traditionally placed within a grave liner or concrete vault to slow the decomposition process.


Like many other industries, funeral homes can now fulfill growing requests to be environmentally friendly. Funeral offerings can be eco-friendly in a process called green (or natural) burial. Before a green burial, a body is not embalmed using chemicals, but is preserved with refrigeration instead. When it is time for the burial, the body is then wrapped in a biodegradable wrap, or shroud, or placed inside a casket constructed of biodegradable materials.

If you are interested in a green burial, you will need to work with your funeral director to find a cemetery that accepts natural burials. As the body and other materials decompose, the gravesite will sink and need to be refilled. Because of this extra labor, most cemeteries require vaults or grave liners. There are, however, some graveyards in the local area who do not require vaults, like the Mellinger Mennonite Cemetery in Lancaster.
