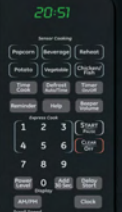

White Goods & Tires Will Be Collected During the Week of April 18 on Your Regular Trash Collection Day!

- **White Goods \$12-** Refrigerators, Washers, Dryers, Stoves, Air Conditioners, Dishwashers, Freezers, Hot Water Heaters, Dehumidifiers, Furnaces, Microwaves, etc. (APPLIANCES ONLY!)
- **Tires \$2-** May be on or off the rim.

YOU MUST HAVE A TAG ON YOUR ITEM IN ORDER FOR IT TO BE COLLECTED!



Residents are asked to place these items at their regular trash collection site on the evening before pickup. A special tag must be placed on each item to be disposed of. Tags may be purchased at the Borough Office, M-F, 7 AM-4 PM, or at the Milanof-Schock Library, 1184 Anderson Ferry Road, during their hours of operation. Tags **MUST** be purchased no later than 2 PM the day before your collection.

Street Sweeping April 11-15, 2016

The Public Works Department will make every effort to have the streets posted with "No Parking" signs the day before sweeping takes place. Please have vehicles moved from the street no later than 7AM, and please do not park vehicles on the street until the "No Parking" signs have been removed. In some cases multiple passes need to be made in order to properly clean the streets. Residents may sweep stones from their sidewalk into the gutter prior to the streets being swept. Please do not put leaves and sticks in the gutter as the sweeper will not pick them up.

Trash Collection Procedures & Guidelines

Reference map on page 3 to know what day your trash will be collected.
Monday– East Ward, Tuesday– West Ward, Wednesday– Florin Ward



Collection can begin as early as 5 AM on your assigned pickup day. Basic service includes three (3) 32-gallon refuse bags/cans. Each bag/can is limited to 30 pounds. Customers are asked to place trash/recycling containers at your pickup site the evening before your assigned day and should be removed promptly after 6 PM. If your trash is missed, please do not remove it from your pickup site. Call the Borough Office before 11 AM the next day at 653-2300 and arrangements will be made to have it picked up.

Special Tags

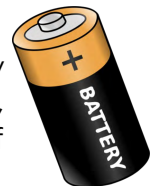
- **ORANGE (Extra Bag Tag) \$1.50 Each-** For additional 32-gallon bags or cans, not weighing more than 30 pounds each.
- **RED (Oversized Items) \$4 Each-** For refuse that will not fit into refuse containers. (ex. Small furniture, carpet, and like items). **Limit of two per week.** Covered devices (ex. TV's and Computers) no longer accepted.
- **GREEN (Grass Bag Tag) \$2 Each-** For bags of grass that need disposed of. **We strongly encourage you to recycle your grass whenever possible.**
- **KRAFT BAGS (Yard Waste excluding grass) \$0.50 Each-** For Woody Waste only. Kraft Bags (trimmings and shrubbery) shall not weigh more than 30 pounds. **(Reference page 4 for the collection schedule.)**

The following list of items are collected curbside, single-stream for recycling:



- Aluminum, Clear Glass, Colored Glass, Steel Cans, Plastics, Paper (Chipboard, Corrugated Cardboard, Magazines, Newsprint, Office Paper and Telephone Books)
- Rule of Thumb: Anything with any number 1-7 is collected with your recyclables.

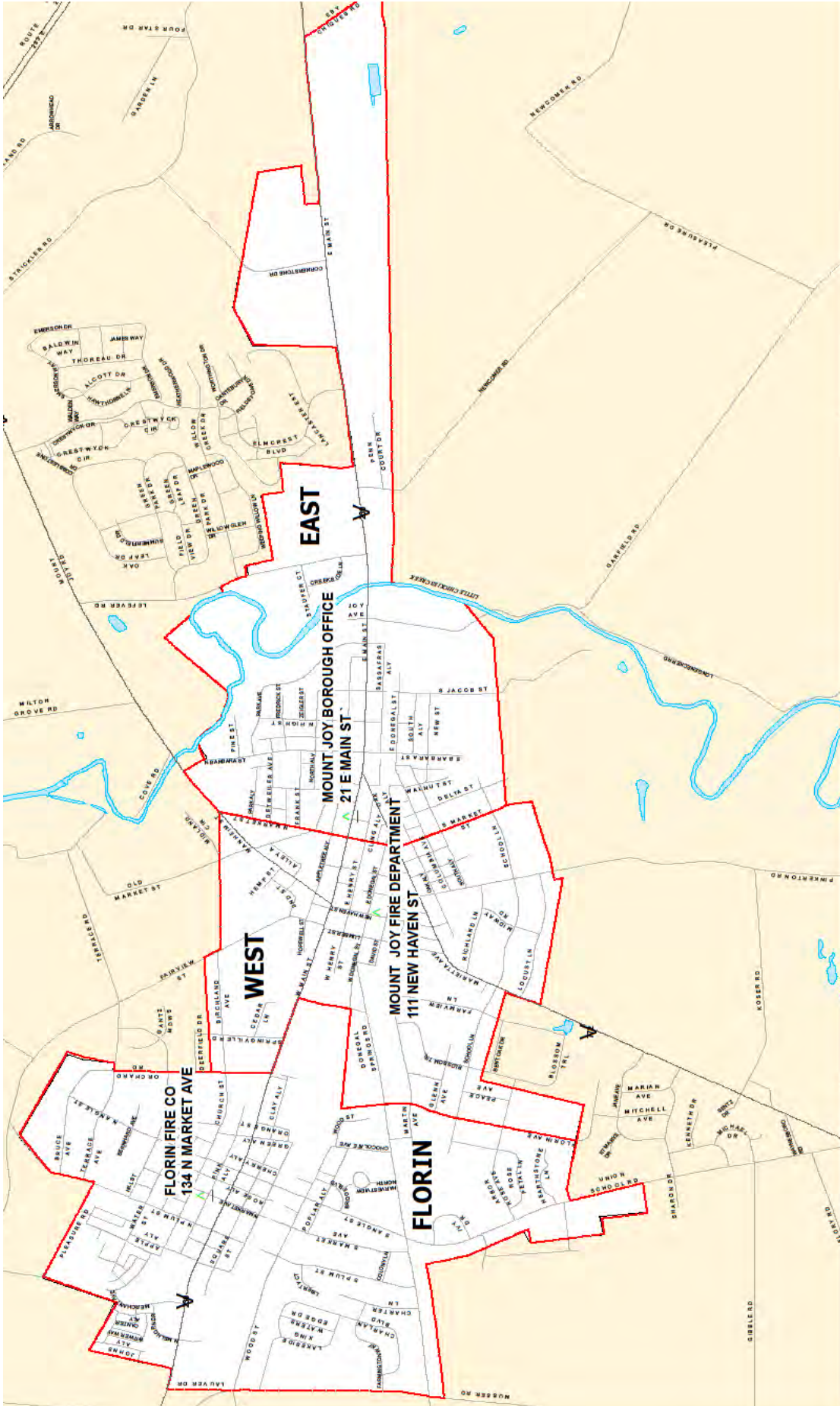
Batteries should also be recycled. Batteries **MUST** be placed in a special battery recycle bag. Bags are available at the Borough Office, 21 East Main Street, Mount Joy, **FREE** of charge. Place batteries in the bag and set the bag on top of your recycle bin for collection.



Please note, while Lebanon Farms Disposal is our refuse and recycling company, what they will accept from each town for recycling is different. Each town has a separate contract with specific items that are allowed to be collected for recycling. If you want to know what is allowed to be put out for recycling, please do **NOT** reference Lebanon Farms Disposal's website. Use the list provided above.

**Cardboard Recycling
Dumpsters Available
At 2 Locations**

Mount Joy Borough has two cardboard **ONLY** recycling dumpsters at the Parks Department Building, 134 North Market Avenue and two cardboard **ONLY** recycling dumpsters located in the parking lot of Little Chiques Park on Park Avenue. Commercial Recycling Required

Pennsylvania's Act 101 and Mount Joy Borough's Ordinance 487 require all commercial establishments to recycle.

Option one is to have your materials collected curbside by Mount Joy Borough's licensed hauler. You would pay a semi-annual bill directly to the borough. There is a 6-bag or can limit (30 lbs. each maximum) for commercial establishments with the Borough's refuse and recycling program. You would also be provided with a recycling bin.

Option two is to opt out of the Borough's collection program and contract with a private hauler. Annual proof of collection is required with this option.

Compost Site Regulations

- The site accepts yard waste materials (sticks, branches, etc.).
- The following items will **not** be accepted: grass clippings, tree branches/trunks over 19" in diameter and/or over 8' in length, tree stumps, construction/demolition waste (boards, etc.).
- Yard waste is not required to be bagged, but if you prefer to do so, Kraft Bags can be purchased at the Borough Office at 21 East Main Street, Mount Joy, or at the Milanof-Schock Library, 1184 Anderson Ferry Road, Mount Joy.

Hours & Directions

From East Main Street, turn onto S. Barbara St., make a left onto E. Donegal St., then a right onto S. Jacob St. Follow S. Jacob St. until you can go no further. Arrive at the Compost Facility.

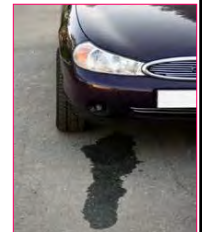
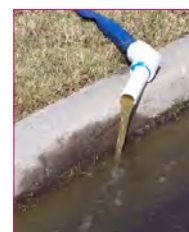
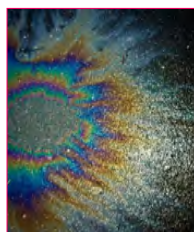

FREE Home Compost Workshops Scheduled

The Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority (LCSWMA) is partnering with municipalities, community organizations and Penn State Master Gardeners of Lancaster County to conduct home compost workshops where residents will learn how to recycle organic waste from their kitchens and gardens instead of putting it in the trash. Composting is an excellent way to recycle vegetable scraps, grass clippings, leaves, and other organic materials and turn them into a useful and valuable soil amendment.

Workshop attendees will also learn how to build effective, yet inexpensive home compost bins to meet their needs. Each household in attendance will be eligible to receive a free kitchen scrap collection bucket courtesy of LCSWMA.

Lancaster County residents are invited to attend any one of the home compost workshops scheduled for this year. If required, residents should pre-register by no later than Friday at noon prior to the workshop they'll be attending.

Typical Spring Property Maintenance Items

Weeds. All properties shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of six (6) inches. All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other than trees or shrubs; provided, however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens.

Motor Vehicles. Motor vehicles which do not have a current license and a current inspection may be stored within a completely enclosed structure on any premises. Unlicensed or uninspected vehicles shall not be stored outside of a completely enclosed structure on a premises if such storage constitutes a nuisance or if such motor vehicle is a hazardous vehicle.

Insect Screens. During the period from April 15th to October 1st, every door, window and other outside opening utilized or required for ventilation purposes serving any structure containing habitable rooms, food preparation areas, food service areas, shall be supplied with approved tightly fitting screens of not less than 16 mesh per inch, and every swinging door shall have a self-closing device in good working condition.

Painting. All wood and metal surfaces, including but not limited to, window frames, doors, door frames, cornices, porches and trim shall be maintained in good condition. Peeling, flaking and chipped paint shall be eliminated and surfaces repainted.

Disposal of Rubbish. Every occupant of a structure shall dispose of all rubbish in a clean and sanitary manner by placing such rubbish in approved containers. **Containers.** The operator of every establishment producing garbage shall provide, and at all times cause to be utilized, approved leak-proof containers provided with close-fitting covers for the storage of such materials until removed from the premises for disposal.

Swimming Pools

Permits: Private swimming pools, hot tubs and spas containing water more than 24 inches in depth shall require a permit.

Enclosures: Private swimming pools, hot tubs and spas containing water more than 24 inches in depth shall be completely surrounded by a fence or barrier at least 48 inches in height. This enclosure may include the walls of the pool itself. Gates and doors in such barriers shall be self-closing and self-latching.

Locations: Any pool, deck or shelter that is elevated above the average surrounding ground level and the water surface of any pool shall be set back a minimum of 10 feet from any lot line. A pool is not permitted within a required front yard.



Mayor Bradley Works to Fight Heroin



In January, Mayor Bradley accompanied by leaders of several critical county agencies and organizations announced the launch of the Lancaster County Anti-Heroin Task Force (LCAHTF). As part of Mayor Bradley's Safer Community Initiative, he worked to spearhead the creation of this task force for over a year and is currently its Chairman. His involvement was triggered by the increased instances of heroin related deaths and crime within the Borough, as well as the concern voiced by the local law enforcement and affected families within the community. The intent of the LCAHTF is to reduce deaths caused by heroin and opioid abuse within the communities across Lancaster County, and will do so through increasing coordination between key County agencies, improving community awareness, and providing increased access to available resources. As part of

The 2016 summer season is quickly approaching and the Mount Joy Lions Club Swimming Pool has been planning for the upcoming season, including staffing, repairs and maintenance and capital projects.

The community will see as the 2016 season begins that some significant capital improvements will have been made at the pool. Although not as obvious as some other improvements, the main pool building now has a new roof replacing a nearly 30 year old one. More apparent will be the replacement of our main driveway and new benches throughout the pool area. The floor(s) in the pavilions will also have been replaced. The Lions Club and the Pool Operating Authority will have invested over \$50,000 in these upgrades this year.

The Pool will open for the season on a limited basis on Saturday, May 28, 2016, following the Memorial Day Parade. Anticipated opening time will be 3 PM. Following the Memorial Day weekend opening, the pool will be open on weekends until school is closed for the summer at which time the regular operating schedule will begin. A day-by-day schedule for this period will be posted at the pool.

After the winter we endured, everyone is anxious for spring to arrive. Birds chirping, flowers starting to blossom and the budding of trees are the signs that spring has sprung. As we start with the outside cleanup from this past winter, now would be a good time to also check a few items you might not have thought of yet. If you have an outside spigot coming through your wall, verify that cold weather over the winter did not damage the fixture. Connect your garden hose with a spray nozzle to the outside spigot and run some water through the hose, then while leaving the spigot valve on, listen and look for any possible water leaking inside or outside the home. Another item sometimes overlooked would be the vent cap on your sewer line. If you have a vent cap, make sure it is clear of debris around the cap, attached firmly to the pipe and that the pipe does not appear to be broken. Although these two suggestions may seem minimal, finding a possible issue early is always better than finding one after the fact.



Use water...but use it wisely

9 Things you can do to save water in the bathroom

1. Check toilets for leaks.
2. Stop using the toilet as an ashtray or wastebasket.
3. Put plastic bottles in your toilet tank.
4. Take shorter showers.
5. Install water-saving showerheads or flow restrictors.
6. Take baths.
7. Turn off the water after you wet your toothbrush.
8. Rinse your razor in the sink.
9. Check faucets & pipes for leaks.

10 Things you can do to save water outside

1. Water your lawn only when it needs it.
2. Deep-soak your lawn.
3. Water during the cool parts of the day.
4. Don't water the gutter.
5. Plant drought-resistant trees & plants.
6. Put a layer of mulch around trees & plants.
7. Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways & sidewalks.
8. Don't run the hose while washing your car.
9. Tell your children not to play with the hose & sprinklers.
10. Check for leaks in pipes, hoses, faucets & couplings.

6 Things you can do to save water in the kitchen & laundry

1. Use your dishwasher only for full loads.
2. Use your washing machine only for full loads.
3. If you wash dishes by hand, don't leave the water running for rinsing.
4. Don't let the faucet run while you clean vegetables.
5. Keep a bottle of drinking water in the refrigerator.
6. Check faucets & pipes for leaks.

Regulations from DEP Regarding Water Main Breaks



There is very specific protocol required by DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) when a water main break occurs. Depending on how and what type of break happens, precautionary boil notices will be put out. When you see the boil notice, there isn't necessarily a problem; we are just following DEP protocol. Please feel free to contact the Mount Joy Borough Authority at 653-5938 if you see a boil notice and have any questions.

Water & Sewer Rate Schedule

Mount Joy Borough Authority strives to keep water and sewer rates as low as it will allow. MJBA also continues to stay in compliance with the Chesapeake Bay Regulations which may, in future plans, raise these rates. MJBA and its staff continue to maintain accurate service for its service district, which includes Mount Joy Borough, portions of Mount Joy Township, East Donegal Township and Rapho Township.

Water: \$51.20 / first 8,000 gallons used each quarter (minimum 0-8,000)

Sewer: \$65.12 / first 8,000 gallons used each quarter (minimum 0-8,000)

- \$6.40 is applied to each 1,000 gallons over the 8,000 gallon minimum for water, but only up to 30,000 gallons, then the rates change.
- \$8.14 is applied to each 1,000 gallons over the 8,000 gallon minimum for sewer, but only up to 30,000 gallons, then the rates change.

Identity Theft and Scams

Am I at risk for identity theft?

Yes, we all are. If you use a smart phone, shop online, bank online, purchase items using a credit or debit card, even visit your doctor or dentist for your annual check-up, you are at risk for identity theft.

How do scammers gain access to my information?

1. Fake loan applications

Scammers can easily gain access to your bank account and social security numbers by attracting you to apply for a fake loan. These websites appear professional, authentic, and promise low-rate loans to U.S. residents. Scammers have even been known to purchase your personal information from legitimate marketing firms that operate loan application services. In reality, the loan does not exist and your information becomes at risk for future identity theft.

2. By hacking online stores

Major stores like Target and Home Depot, as well as banks including Chase, were all victims of major hacks. Reports state that over 150 million personal information files had been compromised last year alone. One out of every two U.S. consumers' personal information now lies in the hands of hackers.

3. Phishing email scams

One classic scam involves hackers posing as representatives from legal institutions or banks by sending fraudulent emails to unsuspecting consumers. These official-looking messages claim that the account has been compromised and needs additional verification before access can be re-established. Scammers will direct you to an identical looking fraudulent website, and require you to enter information such as your login, password, and social security number. Once completed, you will be notified that your access has been re-established. Sadly, the process has been a complete scam and hackers now possess your personal information to use in identity theft.

Personal data, including social security numbers and residential addresses of over 100 million consumers was stolen in the United States in 2015. Scammers trade information through black markets to use in future identity theft operations. The criminals use your identity in order to obtain credit cards, fake mortgages, loans, and cash advances. Once an identity theft occurs, it is a very difficult task to undo the damage.

Where does my personal information go?

- 1.** Scammers may use your personal information for identity theft in several ways. First, scammers may sell and even re-sell your personal information on black markets operating on an invitation-only basis.
- 2.** Scammers may use your information to apply for loans and credit cards, leaving you with the staggering bill and a completely destroyed credit score.
- 3.** Scammers may use your information to create fake identities by applying for a state ID or drivers license in your name.

Collection Agency Scams

Some scammers are well aware that collection agencies have the right to contact consumers who owe money to them or companies they represent. Criminals involved with collection agency scams use this knowledge to their advantage to steal money.

Representing a fake collection agency, or even the United States Attorney General's office or the IRS, scammers make cold calls to victims and threaten lawsuits or embarrassing on-the-job confrontations unless the victims start making payments. Sometimes, the scammers support their claims with real details about outstanding loans. This type of scam can go on for months. After repeated harassment, victims cave to demands and pay a fee. Some time later, the scammers repeat the tactic with the same victims or sell/share the information to other scamming organizations who repeat the vicious cycle. Fee payment is also expected via non-returnable methods, such as Moneygram, Western Union, Vanilla and wire transfer.

Advice: Unless you have bad debt and owe money to collection agencies who have purchased it, block all collection calls. Additionally, if possible, report collection agency scammers to the appropriate government agency. **Identity theft risk: High**

Tech Support Scams

It's rare that any technician from a PC manufacturer or tech support company would cold call non-client computer users and tell them that there's an immediate threat to their computers and that the company needs remote access to fix the problem. Yet, many people fall for this scam.

Operating usually out of India, scammers call victims and allege that they're with a big name tech company. Victims are told that their computers are either already infected or about to become infected with malware that can cause significant damage, such as operating system corruption or identity theft. The "technicians" then urge users to allow them to have remote access to troubleshoot and fix related issues. Scammers use these opportunities to infect systems with malware or perform other damage; or send users to third-party websites that cause damage. All of these actions are focused on the singular goal of giving scammers access to computers so they can cause errors and then charge for unnecessary repair services.

Advice: Never give anyone remote access to your computer. Instead, hire a local computer repair service whenever necessary. As scammers usually ask for payment via credit card, victims have also reported identity theft at a later time. **Identity theft risk: High**

Fake/Counterfeit Merchandise Scams

As scammers usually ask for payment via credit card, victims have also reported identity theft at a later time.

With so many online stores available, it's sometimes very difficult to know the difference between a legitimate e-commerce site and a fake one set up to steal money or a person's identity.

Operating predominantly out of China, scammers set up generic online stores that sell name brand items or mimic the websites of big name brand companies. On these sites, scammers sell fake or counterfeit products at significantly reduced prices designed to attract buyers looking for big deals on name brand merchandise. The over-reaching goal of these scammers is to gain access to the credit card numbers of their victims and then use the numbers to fraudulently make purchases, or make a buck with the information on the black market. In some cases, the criminals even go so far as to send fake or counterfeit products to victims. As the merchandise ships from international locations, victims often remain unaware of any wrong-doing against them until weeks have passed. Although many brand companies discover these sites and shut them down, it's usually too late.

Advice: To verify the identity of a website in question, always contact the brand company using the phone number on the company's official Contact Us or similar page. **Identity theft risk: Medium**

Fraudulent/Fake Check Scams

One of the most popular scams involves scammers convincing unwitting victims to accept fraudulent/fake checks.

Victims with banks accounts in the United States receive checks for whatever reason at much higher amounts than expected. Scammers then use a variety of creative, clever stories to explain any compensation discrepancies and convince the victim to send back overpayment via cash-like payment methods or wire transfer. When these checks bounce, the victim discovers that they have been fleeced. Over the years, this scam has been used with a variety of consumer actions, including purchase of vehicles and renting property.

Advice: Never accept checks with amounts over the agreed upon price. Never agree to send money back. Ask the bank if the check has cleared before releasing the merchandise to the alleged buyer. **Identity theft risk: High**

Old Prescription Disposal

CVS Pharmacy provided us with a drop box for unwanted medication. The box is located inside the front lobby and is accessible anytime the Borough Offices are open to the public. Instructions are posted on top of the box, and clear plastic baggies are provided for depositing medications. **Medications MUST be dumped out of the original prescription bottle and put into one of these bags. They may be mixed together with other medications. NO liquids, ointments or creams. Pills and capsules ONLY.**



Open Burning— Recreational burning is permitted for cooking, i.e., hotdogs. Note: If not in an approved container, the fire **MUST** be at least 50 feet from any structure. If in an approved container, it **MUST** be at least 15 feet from any structure.

Solicitation / Peddlers— Mount Joy Borough requires solicitors going door to door to have a permit, which may be obtained at the Police Station during business hours. If someone comes to your door and is not displaying a proper permit, please advise the Police immediately using 664-1180 non-emergency number.
